Latest COVID19 Update

I hope you are well and eagerly anticipating taking a well-deserved holiday break within the safety of your homes, supported by your family and friends.

Even though our children commenced school holidays earlier this week, our priority at St Paul the Apostle School remains the health and safety of our school community and I must re-iterate that our school remains well-prepared for the impact of COVID-19. Our staff has been busily preparing for the provision of online learning from home in the likelihood that a return to school for the commencement of term two is delayed.

As with our staff, the CECV (Catholic Education Commission of Victoria) has been working diligently to ensure that the focus will remain on supporting staff and school leaders as they plan to deliver continuity in online, offsite learning in partnership with parents during Term 2 across the Archdiocese of Melbourne. The CECV is carefully considering support for students with diverse learning needs and developing resources to assist schools. We'll keep you informed of any updates and helpful resources over the next fortnight.

Provision for Online Home Learning - if a return to school for Term Two is delayed.

As a result the Coronavirus pandemic, schools are implementing an online facility to allow children to keep in touch with their learning. Here at SPA, we have decided to adapt our current student portal to provide a link to the Home Learning Website that allows home learning to occur.

Our Student Online Portal is ready but has not been made available for families to access at the moment as we believe that the school holidays, especially during these uncertain stressful times, provide the perfect opportunity for our children and our families to take time to enjoy quality family time and to learn in a variety of unstructured ways.

As with any school holiday period, families can continue to support their child's learning at home with the provision of daily reading with and to the children, daily journal writing, explorations around the backyard, movies, arts and crafts, singing and dancing, physical activities, puzzles, mindfulness along with games and activities focused on "resilience" – our current school inquiry.

Our approach to Home Learning is a multi-faceted approach and focuses on the provision of engaged, enjoyable and purposeful learning activities but will not include reams of uninspiring worksheets. We would like our children to focus on everyday activities that involve reading, writing and mathematics and also to allow our children to extend their learning and thinking through research and activities based on their current Inquiry topic or their own home environment.

Even though our Home learning is hosted online, many of the activities will not be dependent on digital devices or access to the internet. Children can use the digital devices when available, at home however in most cases you will only access the Home Learning website for instructions. A printed copy of the Home Learning Tasks can also be requested if you do have access to the internet.

Our Student Online Portal now has a link to Home Learning for each Year Level and for each our Specialist areas and Health & Wellbeing, RE, Cooking and Parent Info. Our teachers are currently posting activities to this web-space that will complement our current learning and teaching foci and allow our children to work independently and at their own pace on interest based tasks.

Teachers will post instructions and set up activities to allow the students to work independently and confidently. In the Prep and Junior Levels, we ask that parents facilitate home learning by reading instructions and explaining activities however Middle and Senior Levels are encouraged to work independently. This is a great opportunity for you to engage in your child/children's learning and spend quality time with each other during these unprecedented circumstances.

Our Home Learning web link instructions and expectations will be announced on Tuesday 14 April 2020 via Flexibuzz or at www.spadoreen.catholic.edu.au.

A special reminder that the Premier has announced that staff will resume on Tuesday 14 April (gazetted by the Victorian Government as an additional Staff Planning Day due to COVID19) with the children scheduled to commence on Wednesday 15 April unless circumstances change.

This remains a challenging time for your families, our staff and our global community and I thank you for the support and calmness you have demonstrated for the sake of our children.


The message of Easter with the life, death and resurrection of Jesus remains one of hope and I wish you a happy and safe holiday with your families and loved ones.

Dear Parents, Carers, and Staff,

My prayerful greetings to you all in this Lenten season.
